#### **How to Text**

Tech Tool(s) you'll be using: Smartphone

Video to watch for this topic: How to Text

What kind of smartphone do you have? (brand and model) \_\_\_\_\_\_

Some will have it on the back of the phone—others look in Settings

In Settings – find 'About' (sometimes that is in 'General') or 'My phone'

Turn on your smartphone

Locate the Texting App that came pre-loaded on your phone—usually at the bottom of the Home screen







It will most likely look like a 'chat' bubble

Throughout this Note Sheet our images will show examples of both Android (on the left) and iPhone (on the right)—yours may look different but functions will be similar


Tap on the App's icon to open the App

Once you are using it—you'll be able to see any messages you have received and any previous 'conversations' you've had

If the icon has a circle with a number in it—that is how many 'new' messages you have received since you last opened the App







#### PRACTICE NOW – Opening Texts App

- ☐ Pause the video on this screen—click on video or click Play/Pause button
- ☐ Find your smartphone's Texting App
  - Do you have any messages waiting for you? How many?
    - There is a circle on the App on the Home screen if there are new messages for you
- ☐ Tap on the Texting App's icon to open the App
  - Get to know that screen—it's OK if it's empty (it won't be for long)
- ☐ For the next steps you will need the cell phone # for someone you want to send a text message to
- □ Now that you're done with this practice--Stand up and move your body-sip some water-take a quick break-then come back and get in a good comfortable position to continue with the video
- $\ \square$  Un-pause the video Click on the video or click on the Pause/Play button

### \*\*\*What to do if you lose/close the Video tab during the PRACTICE NOW

To return/find this video again after practice if you have accidentally closed it

Open a new tab in your browser – Go to SeniorTechConnect.Net

Go to the 'Videos and Note Sheets' page



Look in the chart and find this video—click on its name to open this video

Once in YouTube in this video - look in the description below the video

Scroll down and find the timestamp for the practice you just completed – click on it and it will open the video to that practice—so you can continue where you were.

Note: ALWAYS read through your text BEFORE you tap 'Send'—to make sure it really says what you intended to say and that the App or your fingers didn't type something that you were not meaning to say

	☐ Pause the video – click on the video or on the Pause/Play button
	□ Tap on New Message and enter Recipient for your text
	<ul><li>Enter a cell phone # or the Contact's name</li></ul>
	☐ Enter a simple sentence
	<ul><li>Tap into the 'Text message' or 'Enter message' field</li></ul>
	<ul><li>Tap type "Hi (name) I am learning how to text" (no " ")</li></ul>
	☐ Send the text message
	<ul><li>Tap the 'Send' icon and keep this conversation open for next practice</li></ul>
	□ Now that you're done with this practiceStand up and move your body—sip some water—take a quick break—then come back and get in a good comfortable

How can you tell which 'text bubbles' of the text conversation are yours and which are from the other(s)?

How can 'predictive text' help you when you are tap typing a text?



What key(s) do you tap on in YOUR phone's texting App to access the additional character keyboards—and where are they located?

Where is the icon for emojis (smiley faces/little drawings) in YOUR phone's texting App?

NOTE—some emojis have multiple meanings (especially those related to foods/produce) so it's best to clarify what they mean with those that you text so that you're not saying things you don't mean to say.

#### > PRACTICE NOW - Texts with more than letters

- ☐ Pause the video—click on video or click on Pause/Play button
- ☐ Be in the same text message used in the last practice
- ☐ Find the additional character keyboards open and find the?
  - Tap into text field "Can I practice with you?" (no " ")
- ☐ Find the Emojis chart and tap it to open it
  - Tap on a smiley face that fits with this person and this question
- ☐ Tap the 'Send' icon to send this text message
- ☐ Un-pause the video − Click on the video or click on the pause/play button

If tap typing is too difficult for you—

Try using a 'Stylus Pen' with a rubber tip—we have recommendations on our website

Experiment with using the microphone/'speech-to-text' functions of YOUR phone's texting App. Depending on your speech patterns and accent this could work well for you if you don't like the tap typing.



Experiment with using the microphone's 'speech-to-text'

You would then just need to tap into the message to edit/fix any words that didn't come out the way you wanted them to.


Practice using this feature the next time you are sending a text.

And something else to try—if tap typing is too hard OR you want to send someone a voice message


## If tap typing is too difficult – try recorded message feature
